DEACON'S QUESTION BOX

Did the Pope Just Create Catholic Divorce

This week, the Pope announced the third major reform of the annulment process in the history of the Church. Some news outlets are reporting this with a surprising amount of accuracy while others are reflecting their lack of knowledge about the Catholic Church. There are more legal changes in his pronouncement than I can go into here. So let's look at the more important ones.

First, what the Pope has done does not create a Catholic divorce. Divorce says that the reality of marriage was there in the beginning and that now the reality is broken. "Annulment" means a ruling by a Church court that a union between a man and a woman, even if it began with a Church wedding, is not a valid marriage because it fails one of the traditional tests, such as a lack of genuine consent or a psychological incapacity to undertake the obligations, or unwillingness of one of the spouses to have children. The teaching of our Lord remains fully in effect. If a valid marriage was consummated, it is permanent.

Pope Francis did not make the standard for declaring a marriage null easier. The standard for coming to an affirmative decision remains very high — the judge or bishop must reach moral certainty (Canon 1608). Pope Francis clearly reiterates this. He underscores that a mere preponderance of the evidence is not sufficient. It is clear that moral certainty remains the standard. In other words, an affirmative decision cannot be given if the act of marrying were just possibly invalid. Nor could it be given if even it were probably invalid. Rather, it can only be given if it is morally certain to have been an invalid act of marrying.

The focus of these changes as stated by His Holiness is to bring a more merciful process into place making the process open to more Catholics who may need the healing it brings. So he calls for simple cases to be complete in about 45 days and no case should take longer than one year.

When the facts are plain and not in dispute and neither the husband or wife is opposing the declaration of nullity, the bishop can make the ruling himself and no appeal will be made to a second court. This is in accord with our belief concerning the bishop being the successor to the Apostles and, as such, the shepherd and head of his diocese. The right of appeal still remains as it has in the past.

The biggest change in the declaration-of-nullity process is the addition of the "shorter process," by which a diocesan bishop is allowed to determine the case himself. Where both parties to the case consent or where there may be a situation such as those mentioned in his document, application can be made to the diocesan bishop for his determination.

There are several procedural requirements for this, but in broad strokes, the diocesan bishop is to appoint what is called an "instructor" or handler for the case, as well as two assessors, to assess the facts in light of canonical laws. The defender of the bond is also to be informed and involved. These parties give their evaluations of the case to the bishop, who can make a decision if he is able to reach moral certainty about the nullity of the marriage. If not, he is to remand the case to the ordinary process. A party retains the right to appeal the decision to the metropolitan (archdiocesan) court or to the Roman Rota.


