PRO-LIFE MESSAGE

With less than a few days until the U.S. midterm elections, it is time we remind ourselves just how high the stakes of this election are, and what our duties are as Christian citizens.

In a country as populous as ours, with a government as large and seemingly remote as ours, we can easily fall prey to the temptation to believe ourselves just one tiny, insignificant number in a giant machine. “My vote doesn’t really count,” we tell ourselves. And thus, we justify our own laziness, rationalizing our failure to research the issues at stake and where the candidates stand on those issues, and our failure to show up at the polls on Election Day.

The reality is, however, that the results of November’s elections will impact every level of our society – from legislation, to judges, to the educational system, foreign policy, healthcare, and so much more. And though our vote is only one among millions, it nevertheless remains true that the accumulated weight of those millions of votes determines, in crucial ways, the future our country will take. This has never been truer than today, when there hangs in the balance grave moral and social issues: the status of marriage, the family, religious freedom, and respect for human life itself.

It might surprise some Catholics to learn just how deadly seriously the Catholic Church takes the duty to vote. The Catechism of the Catholic Church, for instance, outlines three duties that Catholics have to their countries: “to pay taxes, to exercise the right to vote and to defend one’s country...” (¶ 2240). These three, says the Catechism, are “morally obligatory.”

Pope Pius XII was insistent that if there is a duty to vote, this duty ought not to be exercised willy-nilly, but only in light of objective moral standards. While every Catholic must vote according to his conscience, said the pope, he is enjoined by strict duty to “give his vote to the candidates who offer truly sufficient guarantees for the protection of the rights of God and of souls, for the true good of individuals, families and of society, according to the love of God and Christian moral teaching.”

In other words, a Catholic cannot vote merely for the sake of voting, or according to blind party loyalty. A Catholic is a Catholic all the time, and is *primarily* a Catholic, rather than a member of a certain party, or even a citizen. As such, all Catholics must conscientiously educate themselves not only on the issues at stake in an election, and the stances of individual politicians on those issues, but also the moral teachings of the Church and how to apply those teachings in the voting booth.

Above all, Catholics must be aware that there are some actions that involve matters so grave, and on which Catholic teaching is so clear, that no Catholic can ever knowingly vote for a politician *because* that politician supports these actions. These are so-called “intrinsically evil” actions. When deciding how to vote, our research must *begin* with these issues.

A prime example is the intentional taking of innocent human life, as in abortion and euthanasia. Other examples include redefining marriage, destructive research on human embryos, human cloning, genocide, torture, the intentional targeting of civilians in war, acts of racism, treating workers as mere means to an end, deliberately subjecting workers to subhuman living conditions, treating the poor as disposable...

While it is true that Catholics may at times – alas, in our day and age, all too often! – be forced to choose between politicians who support some of these intrinsically evil actions, and to vote for the “lesser evil,” – *i.e.* the politician who is likely to do the least damage to the common good – these issues in themselves are non-negotiables. This is especially true in the cases of those evils – such as abortion – that constitute direct attacks on human life. For as St. Pope John Paul II repeatedly emphasized throughout his pontificate, a society that doesn’t respect the fundamental right to life is incapable also of protecting other, lesser human rights. To deliberately vote for a pro-abortion candidate *because* of that candidate’s support for abortion would constitute a grave sin, as would voting for a pro-abortion candidate when there is a viable pro-life alternative.

As Catholics, our duty is to lend our voice to the proclamation of the objective truth. As such, our loyalties must transcend party loyalties. This nation is divided on key moral issues – contraception, abortion, homosexual unions, divorce, cohabitation, and euthanasia – which this election will either help to heal or exacerbate. Our task is not to promote a political platform but preach the fullness of the Gospel of Life. For a Christian, politics is merely one area in which the truths of the Gospel may be made manifest in human life.

In this age of great upheaval, when critical moral issues are at stake, it is more incumbent than ever that Christians heed the exhortations of the Church not to renege on their duties as citizens; **as Knights of Columbus**, let us approach the voting booths in November armed with a clear knowledge of the issues and the moral truth, and let us pray fervently that the outcomes of the election lead to the protection of the true common good, above all through the protection of life, marriage, family, and religious freedom. Why is The Period We Are In Called The ‘4th Great Crises’?

Most church historians recognize three great crises that have occurred in the history of the Church. That does not imply that there has not been other difficult times but these are particularly recognized because of the effects on the Church and the dangers they represented. In each, the very existence of the Church as a human organization seemed to be at risk. But the Church prevailed as Jesus promised. It was smaller, more faithful, but it went on.

The first crises came around the year 500 as the Church was recovering from the Arian heresy. The Roman Empire was falling. The role of the Church in the world was changing. The Dark Ages were beginning. The Church did well to survive in the following centuries.

The second crises occurred around the year 1000. The papacy had been deeply corrupted by Italian nobles in the previous century. A string of good popes, Cistercian reformers, helped draw the Church out of its own mire in the 11th and 12th centuries. And the Church survived.

The third crisis was the Reformation starting in 1517. There was rampant corruption in the Church, catechesis was very poor, and preparation for priesthood was inadequate. All of these problems and more were addressed in the Council of Trent and the period of reformation that followed. And the Church survived.

In 1974, Venerable Archbishop Sheen announced that we were at the end of Christendom. He said, “Christendom is economic, political, social life as inspired by Christian principles. That is ending — we’ve seen it die. Look at the symptoms: the breakup of the family, divorce, abortion, immorality, general dishonesty.” He went on to name the issue at the heart of the crises; a desire to get along with the ‘spirit of the world’ which was no longer Christian.

Today, a spirit of sin has entered the Church. That is not to say that Catholics are exalting sin. Rather, we have learned to tolerate it; to wink at it. We have learned to speak only of the good and easy things Jesus taught and to keep quiet about His hard teachings. We look to be comfortable in our faith lives figuring that God’s love will prevent anyone being sent to Hell. The world looks on the Church as irrelevant. But the Church will survive.

Perhaps in our lifetime and almost certainly in the lifetimes of our children and grandchildren, a choice will be forced upon us. Will we recapture the faith of the Church, will we fall in love again with the Catholic faith into which we were baptized, and will we work to build up a reformed Church?

Lay people, clergy, and religious will be called on to defend the traditional faith. We will be called on to rebuild faith communities that support and strengthen each other in living out the complete faith. We can be part of the Church that survives.

In closing, I would like to repeat the often partly quoted words of Francis Cardinal George. “I expect to die in bed, my successor will die in prison, and his successor will die a martyr in the public square. His successor will pick up the shards of a ruined society and slowly help rebuild civilization, as the church has done so often in human history.”


