### FAITHFUL NAVIGATOR'S MESSAGE

**Greetings Worthy Brother Sir Knights**,

On **Sat. June 15** Sir Knight Bud Phillis PFN led us in the **19**<sup>th</sup> **Annual Official Flag Retirement Ceremony** held at the Rock Island Arsenal National Cemetery at Pavilion #2 at 9:00 AM. We saw a record number of 4<sup>th</sup> Degree Knights attend this event to witness a very solemn ceremony to properly and respectively retire the American Flag. Hundreds of flags were collected from Fire Stations across the cities along with all flags from the Arsenal Island and Cemetery and were officially retired on this day. We

were joined by the Vietnam War Veterans Honor Guard, providing a (21) Gun Salute and the Civil Air Patrol Honor Guard presenting the Colors, and a bag piper and drummer who led us into the event with a traditional Irish March and a Drum Cadence. Sir Knight Jeremy Goffier offered up an amazing rendition of our National Anthem and Greg Schneider in his Air Force Uniform led us in the Pledge of Allegiance. Sir Knight Deacon Russ Swim led us in Prayer of Thanksgiving and Blessings of our Nation. Sir Knight Bud Phillis spoke words of wisdom about our Ragged Old Flag. Each attendee

received a portion of a flag to offer to the retirement fire tended by Sir Knights Lowell Gramling, George Huggins and Arnie Green. Taps closed the solemn Ceremony just before the rain started to fall. Many thanks for all that participated in the Ceremony especially those mentioned that did all the coordinating and all the hard work. The weather held until immediately after the ceremony. Refreshments were served after the ceremony under the protection of the pavilion, compliments of the Phillis Family.

### **DEACON'S QUESTION BOX**

See the Abstract Archives for a list of past questions. What is Most Important to Growth in Holiness?

Last month, my column addressed the question 'What is Holiness?'. In a nutshell, being holy is conforming yourself to God. As disciples of Jesus Christ, we all have a fundamental goal to be holy. As St. Peter said, "as he who called you is holy, be holy yourselves in every aspect of your conduct, for it is written, "Be holy because I [am] holy."" [1 Peter 1:15-16]

Many spiritual advisors have different suggestions for the first and most things to focus on in the effort to become holy. They may vary depending on the person being advised, distractions that might need to be dealt with, or sins that must be addressed. Based on my experience, there is one common thing that nearly all people need to address: time.

All of us tend to allocate time based on immediate priorities and desires. We don't tend to look to far out into the future; least of all to that time when we must leave this life. To make it harder, life is becoming busier and more demanding of time; largely at the instigation of Satan. After all, the last thing he wants is for you to be working on mastering holiness. I challenge each of you to do an assessment of how you spend your time. How much is devoted to the things that are <u>really</u> important? That includes your God-given families and other relationships and the things you need to do to support them. How much time is devoted to things that have lesser impact?

Back in the early 90's, Anders Ericsson suggested that it takes 10,000 hours to master a craft. While the actual number may be different, as a rule

of thumb, it comes remarkably close regardless of the craft: medicine, law, plumbing, carpentry, theology. Former legendary golfer Lee Trevino once said, "There is no such thing as a natural touch. Touch is something you create by hitting millions of golf balls." Practicing eight hours per day means it would take five years to amass 10,000 hours.

"So, is it possible that this idea of 10,000 hours could apply to holiness — to mastering one's growth in the faith? Maybe. Maybe not. However, if all we ever do to work on our spiritual development is to go to Mass every Sunday and pray 5 minutes per day (which is higher than average), then it would take about 116 years to achieve that master level. And we wonder why our spiritual life feels flat, so often. But what if we spent 30 minutes per day in a combination of prayer and Scripture study, along with daily Mass? Even if that were just done four days per week (to add to Sunday Mass attendance), that would bring us to 10,000 hours in about 38 years. Suddenly, we have an achievable goal, assuming we live long enough. Add in some Adoration time and some apologetics or patristics reading each week, and we might be able to get this down closer to 20 years. We could take this a step further still, and apply tithing to our time — 2.4 hours per day — then we achieve master-level holiness in about 11 years!" [Vincent Weaver, May 27, 2019, National Catholic Register]

And don't forget, in mastering a craft, there is no 'standing still'. Once a mastery level is achieved, we must continue to work on it or we are falling back.

After you take your self-assessment, think about how you will allocate time going forward. Time is essential to encourage growth in our spiritual life; to achieve holiness.

It is an evening of focused prayer, periods of silence, brief reflections, and intentional, worshipful music in the presence of our Lord and Savior in the Eucharist. There <u>was</u> a vast divide between middle America and the coastal "elites" who often purport to speak for the people in the current national debate over abortion, until the Pro-Abortionist in the Illinois Legislature passed and the Governor recently signed into law the most radical pro-abortion legislation in the country. Now the Chicago elites have joined the coastal elites! And Illinois will become the abortion mecca of the Midwest, paid for by the Illinois Taxpayer, who is already overburdened with debt and taxes to come, passed by this same group of thugs.

Poll after poll has found that most Americans are deeply divided over abortion. Unfortunately even Catholics seemed to be equally divided. One recent poll, for instance, found that a solid 50% of Americans say that, in general, abortion is "morally wrong," whereas only 42% said that it is "morally acceptable." Another recent poll found that almost 80% of Americans oppose abortion in the third trimester. Yet another poll this year found that 75% of Americans favor restricting abortion to – at the very most – the first three months of pregnancy (i.e. the first trimester).(Note that only three countries worldwide allow abortion after the first trimester, China, North Korea, and the USA. Aren't we in great company??) That same poll found that 65% of respondents said that if the Supreme Court were to revisit the Roe v. Wade case, the Court should either allow states to determine their own abortion laws (49%), or completely outlaw abortion (16%).

Naturally, it is deeply tragic that Americans, let alone Catholic Americans, support any abortions at all. However, numbers like these expose the reality that the actual state of abortion law in the United States is far more permissive that what most Americans would like to see. Under Roe v. Wade, there is nothing preventing states from allowing abortions right up until the point of birth – which is precisely what we saw New York, Illinois and a few other blue states explicitly allow in their recent extreme new laws. Gone are protestations and handwringing that abortion is a "tragic necessity." Instead, abortion is increasingly treated as a positive good. In fact, a few states seem to be in a competition for who can pass the most radical laws. The leader in this grotesque competition at the moment: Illinois.

Given this, we shouldn't be surprised that many red states right now are pushing back by passing prolife laws designed to challenge the status quo created by Roe v. Wade, and to protect the lives of babies much earlier, or even from the very beginning of pregnancy. How encouraging that despite the enormous pressure coming from the rich and the powerful, pro-life legislators and ordinary citizens are making such unprecedented progress in protecting the lives of the most innocent. State after state is passing bills designed to challenge Roe v. Wade, protecting unborn babies from being murdered in their mothers' wombs earlier and earlier in pregnancy. We might even catch up with the rest of the world in protection of innocent human life, outside of China & North Korea.....

One new law, in Alabama, amounts almost to a complete ban on abortion. Unfortunately, due to *Roe* 

v. Wade, this law and the various "heartbeat" bills being passed around the country will not immediately go into effect. Instead they are being blocked by pro-abortionist judges, but they will inevitably make their way to the Supreme Court, which will have to decide whether or not to uphold arguably the worst Supreme Court decision in the history of our country. I've often wondered why we never get any pro-life judges to stay pro-abortion laws passed like we have just witnessed in Illinois, but it doesn't seem to happen.

The job of the pro-life movement right now is to stay focused. Let the elite, with their self-centered and self-destructive ethos of sexual libertinism at any cost, including the lives of the innocent, make their threats and spread their lies and misinformation. Let the media paint pro-lifers as the villains or extremists.

For our part, we must continue to peacefully and prayerfully, but shrewdly and determinedly, use the opportunity handed to us at this point in history to place a legal mantle of protection over the lives of the unborn. Let us work with everything we have to make our country a more loving, compassionate place for unborn babies and their mothers. Let this thought motivate us: If we succeed, there may well one day be hundreds of thousands, even millions, of babies who will escape the abortionist's scalpel, and who will go on to enjoy the opportunity to live a full life, and to contribute to the common good with their gifts and talents. Keep up the good fight. In the end, God and His faithful followers will face a loving God who will say to us, Come, faithful follower, come into the house of the Lord. Will each of us be part of this group, or will we like Eve, try to blame our way past God's Judgement Day. There is no excuse for anyone to believe that we have the right to do something very wrong!!!! Follow the science in addition to church teaching.....
